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Foreword

NEVER IN A MILLION YEARS DID I IMAGINE THAT RUSA LGBTQ + WOULD EVENTUALLY BECOME A FORMALLY REGISTERED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION.

After nearly 16 years of community building, we eventually came of age in 2022 when we registered as a nonprofit. As I present our first annual report, I would like to focus on the many accomplishments of 2023.

Our first full year as a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization was filled with milestones: receiving our first seed funding, establishing a board and solidifying our strategic directions, hiring our first paid staff, launching an active chat channel with nearly a thousand users, organizing our seventh and the largest Brighton Beach Pride concluded with a fantastic afterparty featuring our community talent. We also launched Rainbow Connections, a one-to-one program that pairs volunteers with newcomers for English practice, companionship, and orientation to the US.

Amidst the many challenges faced by the LGBTQ+ community, including the imposition of anti-LGBTQ+ legislation in Russia, the labeling of the "global LGBTQ movement" as extremist, the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, regional conflicts, New York City asylum seeker shelter emergencies, and a lack of legal and social services in New York City, RUSA LGBTQ+ is working tirelessly to support its rapidly expanding community.

In 2023, more than 2,000 new asylum seekers participated in RUSA's Pride marches, events, and moderated chat channels. Over 800 people received direct support through RUSA's referrals, legal assistance, and job and housing orientations. RUSA reached and assisted more than 3,000 persons via educational publications, social media, and newsletters. In 2023, RUSA has welcomed the largest number of asylum seekers since our founding in 2008. To meet the challenge of helping more LGBTQ+ individuals, families with children, and youth, we at RUSA LGBTQ+ focus on building our organizational capacity.

As RUSA LGBTQ+ grows, my hope is that our grassroots organization will keep strengthening the community of LGBTQ+ refugees from the Eurasian region and further amplify our collective voice to demand equality and human rights for everyone.

RUSA LGBTQ+, headquartered in New York City, is a community-based, nonprofit organization of Eurasian LGBTQ+ immigrants, women, and other people with intersectional identities and their allies. In solidarity with other grassroots groups, RUSA builds the power of people to change unjust policies, discriminatory societal attitudes, and oppressive ideologies to create a more equitable world.

RUSA LGBTQ+ was formed as a grassroots group in 2008, and registered as a nonprofit organization in 2022. RUSA provides informational support and mutual aid to asylum seekers and other immigrants in the United States and organizes events to build a stronger community of LGBTQ+ immigrants and allies and increase the acceptance and inclusion of LGBTQ+ people worldwide.

Vision

Our vision is a world where the Eurasian LGBTQ+ immigrant community is an integral and active part of social justice and human rights movements in the United States and globally, whose common goal is a world where people of all races, ethnicities, sexual orientations, gender identities, and abilities exercise their human rights fully, openly, and safely, without fear, violence, bigotry, or discrimination.





The values and keywords driving our work are: gender justice, transparency, belonging, chosen family, joy, civic engagement, human rights, immigrant justice, racial justice, and solidarity.

We also endorse anti-imperialism, celebrating differences, diversity, inclusion, mutual support, and volunteer engagement. We strive towards disability justice, equity, liberation, mobilization, cultural humility, participation, and pride.



Our strategic goal is community building and strengthening. Through community events, mutual aid, referrals, and orientations, we build a community of Eurasian LGBTQ+ immigrants. We unite against structural and interpersonal discrimination of LGBTQ+ individuals, women, refugees, and other underprivileged groups.

As a new nonprofit, RUSA also focuses on its capacity building and sustainability. We increase RUSA's knowledge and skills to support our community, deliver RUSA's mission, and ensure a stable, long-term, impactful, and effective organization.



Programs

Through various activities, we work towards building a more robust support system, a stronger community, and more effective advocacy for the rights of LGBTQ+ immigrants.

During 2022-2023, the number of Eurasian asylum seekers in the USA has increased exponentially. LGBTQ+ people from Russia and other post-Soviet countries seek asylum because everyone expressing LGBTQ+ identity—transgender people especially—in these countries have been oppressed through ongoing waves of anti-LGBTQ+ legislation. After the start of the Russian government's aggression against Ukraine in February 2022, their persecution greatly intensified. In 2023, the Russian government both banned transgender medical care and designated the entire "international LGBTQ movement [to be] 'extremist.'"

Community events

Regular in-person community meetings and events provide a safe space to build a sense of belonging, make friends, receive support, and learn. We serve refreshments and distribute necessities like clothing and personal hygiene items. Guest speakers from nonprofit and public agencies join to present their services.

We see an average of 25-30 new participants join each month, and our events have an attendance ranging from 15 to upwards of 200 people. Our annual Brighton Beach Pride attracts hundreds of participants.

Our social outings and art programs foster community engagement and provide opportunities for LGBTQ+ immigrants to connect and express themselves creatively, promoting social integration and overall wellbeing. Our community members- musicians, singers, painters, and drag artists - perform and present at the Brighton Beach Pride, World Refugee Day, and other events around the city.

In 2023, we organized 47 events, mostly in person. These included seven advocacy and community organizing events, ten health and well-being events, seven information sessions, 20 social and cultural gatherings and programs, three volunteer trainings, and one winter coat distribution event.

Rainbow Connections

The Rainbow Connections program started in November 2023. It offers one-to-one pairing between local volunteers and LGBTQ+ newcomers for English language practice and orientation to the US.

40 active Rainbow Connections

pairs are meeting in six-month cycles. We are working to expand this program further by recruiting more volunteers.

The program is based on the previous iteration of a similar program, which ran from 2015-2017 in partnership with Congregation Beit Simcha Torah (CBST), Welcoming the Stranger. Several volunteers who participated in this program returned and now volunteer in Rainbow Connections, demonstrating long-term volunteer dedication and the program's success.

Health and wellbeing programs

Health services navigation

In 2023, in partnership with NYU Langone and our volunteer LGBTQ+ healthcare navigator, who is now our newest board member, we handled over 500 healthrelated cases, assisting with health insurance enrollment, making medical appointments, obtaining emergency medications and treatments, and finding culturally appropriate health and mental healthcare.

Peer support groups

To counter a lack of bilingual mental health services, we organize and facilitate peer support groups where LGBTQ+ immigrants can connect in their own language. These groups provide a supportive environment for discussing challenges, seeking advice, and receiving emotional support from volunteer facilitators who are immigrants themselves with backgrounds in case management, psychology, and art therapy. In 2023, two groups, a mental health support group and a peer support group for transgender people, met regularly.

Case management, referrals, and accompaniments

We address health, safety, food, and clothing issues, ensuring individuals receive the necessary support and resources. Led by coordinators and a team of volunteers, RUSA has advocated for the rights and well-being of LGBTQ+ individuals residing in shelters and neighborhoods.

We refer our community members to trusted social and healthcare services and English classes, providing accompaniments and interpretation. In 2023, we assisted over 1000 LGBTQ+ immigrants in accessing social and other services such as NYC HRA (Human Resources Administration) and HASA (HIV/AIDS Services Administration), and also IDNYC, banks, and legal services by providing personal accompaniment, interpretation, and personalized referrals.

We moderate an <u>online chat channel with over 1000 people</u> where we share resources, exchange advice, and answer questions.



Information guides

We have created and are constantly updating an extensive information guide for our community members and volunteers on the immigration process, housing, public benefits, English classes, higher education, and career resources, among other information requested by the community. We also collect information and feedback from our partners and the community on improving the guides.

Community Impact:

"After recently moving from Russia, it was imperative for me to find a community in which I could benefit people who were not accepted in their former countries. Here, I found friendly organizers and volunteers with whom it was interesting to talk to and feel involved in the meetings. After living in a country where it is tough and problematic to find such communities, I am very pleased to see open people and meetings on topics that, it seems, concern most newcomers!" When my husband and I were living in our first shelter, and we encountered a problem with staying there (it became unsafe), we contacted all organizations for assistance as we were completely new here and didn't know anything. RUSA not only helped us navigate where to go and whom to turn to for help but also didn't leave us out on the streets, quite literally. You guys are doing tremendous work, the entire RUSA LGBT+ team. Emergency cash assistance and other mutual aid

We coordinated emergency cash assistance and other mutual aid to LGBTQ+ immigrants who faced hardship. We raised these funds from other immigrants in the community, allies, and supporters. We collected and distributed over \$10,000 in 2023. We also conducted clothing and household item drives. Last year, we partnered with the First Presbyterian Church for a coat distribution event. Additionally, we partnered with Ruth's Refuge, that delivers new furniture to people who move from shelters into apartments.

Legal assistance

In partnership with RIF Asylum Support and SAFE Asylum, we provided legal orientation and assistance to LGBTQ+ immigrants. RUSA community participates in weekly RIF Asylum Support group legal consultations. A joint pro se asylum clinic with SAFE Asylum started in the fall of 2023 at the Brooklyn Community Pride Center. At this pro bono clinic our trained volunteers help fill out the asylum applications and other immigration forms under the supervision of SAFE Asylum attorneys. In 2023, we assisted with over 100 asylum cases.

Advocacy

We advocate for our population through mass media appearances, commentary, and partnership building and join organizations and coalitions to better advocate for immigrants, refugees, asylum seekers, LGBTQ+ populations, low-income families, and other New Yorkers. We participate in NYC Pride, NYC borough Prides, and immigrant and LGBTQ providers' coalitions and networks. In 2023, RUSA LGBTQ+ was featured in at least <u>20 TV programs, newspapers, and</u> online mass media.

We meet with local elected officials to work together on better supporting LGBTQ+ immigrants.

Brighton Beach Pride



Community Impact

I want to share my experience volunteering in the organization RUSA LGBTQ+, which organizes meetings and events for LGBTQ+ people in New York. I volunteered in this organization for about two months, helping with the organization and conducting various events such as educational seminars, psychological groups, and gay parades. I was impressed by the professionalism and enthusiasm of the volunteers who faced discrimination, violence, and persecution from authorities and society. RUSA LGBTQ+ organizes the annual Brighton Beach Pride. Brighton Beach Pride is our flagship community and advocacy event. This celebration of LGBTQ+ identity and diversity brings the community together, raises awareness, and promotes inclusivity, especially in southern Brooklyn.



Gay City News and several local bloggers and outlets covered the event.

In 2023, the 7th Brighton Beach Pride was one of the biggest yet, with a thousand people attending. A prominent journalist Masha Gessen of CUNY and the New Yorker. Iman La Caire of TransAsylias, Sashko Krapivkin, a Ukrainian activist and actor, and LGBTQ activist Ann Northrop, a representative of Governor Hochul office all speaking in support of LGBTQ+ refugees. This year, we also had the largest pride afterparty at the historic Coney Island USA building, featuring our community talent, including drag performances, dancing, singing, and instrumental live music.

The way Brighton Beach Pride started was that there was an influx of LGBTQ refugees from Russia after the first round of anti-gay laws was passed in Russia, and a lot of them landed here in Brighton Beach and encountered a lot of homophobia and transphobia," Masha Gessen, a prominent trans, and non-binary Russian journalist, told Gay City News. Gessen — who delivered remarks to the crowd in Russian — was referring to Russia's notorious 2013 anti-LGBTQ law that erased queer people from public life and led to widespread crackdowns on members of the community. The Russian government's treatment of LGBTQ people has only grown harsher during the war.

In 2023, we streamlined our volunteer engagement efforts by supporting several volunteer aroups. We conducted volunteer orientations for Rainbow Connections volunteers, and asylum application volunteer training in partnership with SAFE Asylum.

RUSA LGBTQ+ has a core volunteer group of asylum seekers and first- and secondgeneration immigrants who support events, assist in the legal clinic, and moderate chat channels. We created task groups for the Brighton Beach Pride project, Boston and Fort Lauderdale support groups, mutual aid, and in-person event support.

Over 1000 volunteer hours, with 20 hours a week on average, in 2023 helped us to run our programs. With the new Rainbow Connections, the number of volunteer hours is increasing exponentially, with each volunteer giving at least two hours a week.

Board

RUSA LGBTQ+ has a seven-person board. All board members volunteer and provide day-to-day support by representing RUSA, welcoming newcomers, assisting with partnership building and communication strategy, and ensuring the organization stays focused on its mission. The board members are all immigrants and refugees from various countries, and most have been long-term RUSA LGBTQ+ community members and volunteers.

Community Impact

We want to express immense gratitude to you from our family! Personally, RUSA helped our family with money when we really needed it, and also provided school supplies for our son. In the fall, RUSA gave our whole family gift cards, with which we purchased winter jackets. For this, we say a warm thank you to RUSA every frosty day! Also, RUSA organizes and conducts weekly meetings with lawyers, during which we receive much useful information. Many thanks to RUSA for organizing individual English practice with volunteers! Internal policies and procedures

We are creating various policies and procedures. We created a RUSA community agreement for all our community members and volunteers, which spells out the principles of our work, general rules, and sanctions to create and maintain a safe space for everyone.

In December 2023, RUSA LGBTQ+ relaunched its website.

Staffing and space

Our two paid part-time coordinators and acting executive director managed all the above activities and over 100 volunteers. All our activities together provide wraparound support for LGBTQ+ immigrants to build a stronger community for better community strengthening, support, and advocacy. Thus, we plan to garner more support to increase salaried hours for three staff members, provide small stipends for core volunteer leaders, and meet essential communication, administration, and event expenses. We are searching for free or low-cost office space as well.

In 2023, the Brooklyn Community Pride Center, Pier57, Coney Island USA, and the NYC Pride donated the meeting spaces.



Financial Overview

In 2023, the total cash expenses were \$85,000. We spent 60% of this on personnel. We hired two part-time coordinators in 2023. Other board members and core volunteers contributed substantial time and expertise inkind.

Our operational expenses were 15% of our budget, which included food for community events, printing, website and communication tools subscriptions, and membership fees.

We also engaged professionals for short-term projects and support, spending 15% on independent contracts.

We distributed mutual aid in cash and computers, household items, clothes, and hygiene items (10% of our budget) to our community members who experienced financial and health hardship.

In 2023, RUSA LGBTQ+ received its first funding from individual donations and private foundations, which RUSA had earmarked for two years.

Future Work

RUSA LGBTQ+ is rapidly developing as a newly registered nonprofit. We are working on strengthening our community to have a more powerful voice at the policy level. Specifically, we intend to regularly participate in legislative advocacy alongside our colleagues at the New York Immigration Coalition, New Pride Agenda, and other organizations to fight for the rights of asylum seekers, LGBTQ+ immigrants, and all other underprivileged groups in New York City and worldwide.

Through engagement in outreach and specialized training, we will continue to expand the number of volunteers involved. We aim to increase our capacity to connect more community members with volunteers in Rainbow Connections. Furthermore, we will continue developing internal policies and procedures, particularly regarding our communication strategy and policies. We will build an advisory committee to assist RUSA with external partnerships and fundraising.

RUSA plans to expand our programming around workforce development, mental health support, and innovative community building. We will work to improve our fundraising capacity, as well as our messaging and communication.
